Not headlines anyone would want to see and thankfully not true-yet-but if unsupervised dogs continue to roam around our village and Parish then we may see these and more besides. To be clear, I am a dog lover and a dog owner so I have no gripe with the dogs who are generally lovely, it is irresponsible owners who are not with their dog to supervise and *very* importantly pick up dog mess that I have trouble with.

Both the Parish Council and Village Hall and Green Trustees have been receiving complaints about unaccompanied dogs and the proliferation of dog mess in the past few months. Clungunford is a very nice place to live and we don't want this to escalate to neighbourly disputes or reverting to legal options. However, if people continue allowing their dogs run loose then action can be taken which could result in fines and your dog being removed.

So, to summarise.

- Don't let your dog out unaccompanied as it is dangerous to other people and your dog.
- Always pick up your dog's mess. It is just the decent thing to do.
- Do contact me if you do not understand your legal and social obligations of dog ownership and what penalties you are likely to incur in breaking them.

Nursing notes

Postcard from Africa

In this era of climate change and unpredictable weather patterns, it has been said that a potential cause of international conflict in future will be access to water. Water is essential for all forms of life and with an increasing global population, water consumption increases while the amount of water we have on this planet is finite. Competition for access to water and for the control of river flows is inevitably going to increase and protocols will need to be put in place globally to ensure that the above prediction does not come true. A very delicate situation currently exists in the Horn of Africa over just this issue.

Of the River Nile which reaches Egypt, 85% of the water comes from the Blue Nile, which rises in Ethiopia, flows westward through Sudan and joins the White Nile at Khartoum. Although there is one dam on the Blue Nile, in Sudan, it is a relatively small one that has no major impact on the overall flow of the river. However, on the Ethiopian side of the border, for the last five years, what will be Africa's largest dam has been under construction, aimed at producing enough electricity to meet the country's needs now and for many years to come. The reservoir that will be created will cover an area bigger than greater London and stretch for 250km upstream.

Downstream of Ethiopia, more than 1000km away is Egypt, a country with a population of nearly 100 million people, most of whom live along the fertile Nile valley. Most of the people are involved in agriculture, either as subsistence farmers or growing crops for sale in the urban markets. Some of their produce can be found for sale here in Britain. All of this agriculture is dependent on irrigation and the River Nile is the only available source of water. Egypt is extremely worried that Ethiopia will be able to control the flow of the Nile, once the dam is completed, and the amount of water reaching Egypt will be reduced. Consequently, they have threatened military action against the dam if Ethiopia doesn't halt construction.

In the short term, Egypt's fears probably have some justification. Construction work on the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam as it is called will be completed by 2023, but then it will take 5-7 years for the reservoir to fill. Ethiopia understandably will want to start generating electricity as soon as possible, so they will only release a minimum amount of water into the river while the reservoir is filling. Although Egypt has a large reservoir of its own - Lake Nasser and the High Aswan Dam – that helps to regulate the flow through the lower Nile valley, there is great concern about the reliability of the future flow of the river especially at times of low rainfall. Even at present consumption levels and with the current rate of population growth, it is predicted that Egypt will be facing water shortages by 2025.

Use of the Nile water is currently governed by an agreement reached between Britain and Egypt, signed in 1929 that not only gave Egypt almost unrestricted use of the flow in the river, but also the power of veto over any plans to extract water from the river by any of the countries upstream through which the river flows. Even 90 years later, Egypt insists that this agreement still applies and Ethiopia should therefore have obtained Egyptian approval before starting work on the dam. Of course they did not: as a sovereign state, Ethiopia claims the right to use water flowing through its territory for approval from without the need Unfortunately talks between the two countries have not made much progress – a classic case of an unstoppable force up against an immovable object. Common sense suggests that it ought to be relatively easy to find a solution to this problem, to meet the needs of both countries without resorting to armed conflict, even though both sides will have to make compromises. It could be a win-win situation: Ethiopia will have surplus electricity to export and Egypt could benefit from cheap power generated from renewable sources. Ethiopia needs to be sensitive to the needs of its downstream neighbours and guarantee at least a certain minimum flow but for its part, Egypt needs to refrain from threatening the use of force to impose its will far beyond its borders. *Rob Rees*

Early autumn weather – wet and mild but with a dry spell in September

Although August was wet overall, the last ten days were dry and warm with 26°C on the 26th at Hopton Heath.

September continued the tendency for weather to change after ten days. The first ten days were moderately warm with light rain, with a total rainfall of 17mm. The next ten days were dry and warm, with only 1mm rain and a mean maximum temperature of 19°C (possibly an Indian summer?) However, the last ten days of September were extremely wet with a total of 116mm rain and five days with over 10mm and two with over 25mm.

October has been consistently wet up to the 20th with only three days without rain. The total up to the 20th is 86mm with three days recording more than 10mm. It has been mild and I recorded only one day with a slight frost (on the 17th). It has been wetter in many parts of the country, with the Met. Office recording 100mm or more widely up to the 20th. It appears to be dry today and the forecast is for a few more dry days until the 25th. Perhaps the weather changes are now going to be every five days.

In the Garden

A foggy day in Clungunford and I've been doing what I always do at this time of year – cutting my hedges. Thinking back, though, to warmer and sunnier days. August Bank Holiday Monday for instance.

Last bank holiday Monday was a very hot day here in Clungunford and we had been sitting outside on the patio watching the martins catching insects high in the sky above us. Just after we came indoors from doing that around 6.30 pm something which looked very like a swallow in shape flew into our kitchen and then disappeared from view entirely, though we went from room to room downstairs looking for it. It seemed unlikely it could have been a bird had flown into the house like that, because previous experience of birds doing that is that they fly around in a panic and are difficult to control. This intruder had disappeared completely. With our previous experience of having a bat in the house we thought that was a more likely intruder. Some years ago now we were sitting watching television when something passed through the room on the periphery of our vision and disappeared into my study. When I went to investigate I found a Pipistrelle bat clinging to one of the long curtains covering the bay window. Not wanting to handle it, I searched out a butterfly net I had in the garage, caught the bat in it and put it back outside where it belonged. Further investigation showed there was a window open along the upstairs landing the bat must have come in through.

We saw nothing more of the intruder and had begun to believe it must have flown back out as swiftly as it had flown in though we hadn't seen it go.

We went to bed around midnight and I came out of my bedroom almost immediately to come face to face with something with large pointed wings flying at high speed along the landing. At my sudden appearance in front of it it wheeled into the adjacent bathroom and I closed the door behind it so it couldn't escape, wondering how I was going to open the window in there to let it out without it coming back onto the landing past me. When I opened the bathroom door to do just that, however, it was no longer there. I met it coming back up the stairs at high speed and assumed it must have escaped via the gaps around the pipes leading from either the sink or the bath. I went to put on the overall I wear when looking at my bees, because I had only been wearing pyjamas until that point. Coming back up the stairs wearing it I met the fast moving creature just flying down the stairs to escape Iris, who had appeared at the top of them at that moment. At my sudden appearance in its path again it wheeled away into the study to avoid me. Lucky for all of us that was, because the study has a door I was able to fix and stand in front of so it couldn't escape back into the house.

It was clear by now this was some sort of bat, though not a Pipistrelle this time. It clung to the same curtains that had whilst I opened the windows at either side of the study and with frequent bursts of rapid speed on those long pointed wings, it eventually made its way to the larger of the windows, out of it and away.

Consulting the internet the next day showed our visitor to have been the largest of the British bats, a Noctule, noted for its rapid flight on pointed wings. The internet also said Noctule bats fly two hours either side of dusk, often in the company of Martins, so I suppose that was what it had been doing when it accidently strayed into our kitchen.

I also suppose the reason we didn't see it after it had done that was that it had been hiding from potential enemies in the shape of two humans, who might have harmed it in some way if they'd come across it, until we seemed to have gone to bed, after which it came out from wherever it had been hiding and tried to find its own route to freedom. It wouldn't have succeeded though without my help, because we don't leave windows open overnight. Who knows what might have happened to its bid for freedom without me there to help it on its way.

In the garden looking quite magnificent at the moment because it has managed to retain most of its leaves despite autumn winds and rain, look out for *Vitis cognetiae*, the Crimson Glory Vine, a deciduous woody-stemmed tendril climber, grown more for its foliage than its black berries, growing vigorously to fifty feet or more.


