Everyone at Clungunford Village Hall hopes that the path out of lockdown continues as expected over the summer. We are keen to return to some level of normality and see each other again.

Although the hall has been closed for a while, it is wonderful to see so many people making use of the Village Hall Green during lockdown. Thank you to the many volunteers who maintain this vital open space. We hope you like the new signage.

As restrictions lift, the hall will host events and be available for hire again. When we do, we will always observe the latest social-distancing and hygiene guidance.

We plan to have limited open-air **Bar Nights** from late May, and we already have an 'Arts Alive' **Improv Night** booked at the end of June. We are also planning a big **Summer Party** on the Village Hall Green in July to celebrate being able to socialise again. So, there are a few dates for your diary. Let's hope they won't be cancelled, but please check clungunford.com for the latest information if the COVID-19 situation changes.

We are aware that there are some new residents in the parish since the hall closed in 2020, and we look forward to seeing you all. In normal times we offer a wide variety of activities for the community. These include:

- a community pub – run and staffed by volunteers;
- arts and live-music events;
- big screen cinema through 'Flicks in the Sticks';

- regular Saturday night dances.

The hall is also available for hire and some of the activities offered by those hiring the hall have included bingo nights; circle dancing; yoga; table tennis; motorbike nights; and local air rifle clubs.

You can also hire the hall for a private event. And in 2021 we are welcoming a visiting Post Office van service (see page 8).

If all goes to plan, we expect that hall will be available for hire from 21st June and it will be after this date that most regular events may re-start at the hall. We hope to publish a list of activities that are returning to the hall later in the summer. Check out clungunford.com or watch out for information in the Gunnas Gazette.

Flowers for St Cuthbert's



As we begin to tip-toe out of lockdown and reform as a community, I thought it would be a good opportunity to explain to people about the volunteers that provide fresh flowers for St Cuthbert's and see if any new people would like to join our list.

There has been a church on the site since the 13th century and St Cuthbert's is listed with the Shropshire Historic Churches Trust. As a result of its long history and listing we have many visitors from all over the UK and the world and there has always been a tradition of having some fresh flowers and foliage on display. This little gesture makes the church seem vibrant and cared for and is often commented on in the visitors' book.

Sadly, due to Covid-19, St Cuthbert's has been mostly locked for the past year but we are hopeful that this situation will change soon.



So, what is involved? We do not require florists (although if we have any that would be great!) Basically, you would be asked to make two simple arrangements, a couple of times a year. We usually pull together for any special events such as Harvest/Easter and Christmas and fill the church windows which does make it look very special. We tend to use seasonal, local flowers and

foliage. You do not have to be a church attendee. You do not have to be female and you certainly don't have to have any experience which is how I started when I moved here! If anyone would be interested in helping then we would be very grateful and I am very happy to have a "no commitment" chat with you.

In the Garden

A sunny day in Clungunford but without the balmy weather we might have found on holiday in a warmer clime if we were able to visit one. In fact it's blooming cold out there!

One of the better things about watching the Beechgrove garden on TV is that, unlike Monty Don's garden, which always seems to me to have a climate more appropriate to Cornwall than Clungunford, even though it's supposedly only a few miles away from here, they actually have worse weather than we do. A week or so ago, when we had a very unseasonal snowfall in the garden, which lingered a few hours, they had a blizzard so bad they couldn't get back out into the garden for several days.

The trouble with our weather at the moment is that we've had virtually no rain at all since the floods of February, which eventually led to the telephone cable outside our house falling victim to a tall lorry forced to come through our village because all other roads had been closed to it because of floods.

I've had to water the new plantings I have out in the garden, and on top of that, night time temperatures have been below freezing for a week or more now, just at the time our fruit trees have been in flower, so we probably won't get any fruit from them again.

At least we didn't get the initial warmth this year like we did last year, encouraging the potatoes to send up new growths which were then knocked back by late frosts. This time it's been too cold for that.

The old adage used to be that you could start sowing seeds in the garden when the ground was warm enough to sit on unclothed. If you tried to do that in my garden at the moment, I fear it wouldn't be very kind to your extremities!

In the garden, probably hanging fire because of inclement weather, look out for the sweetly scented flowers of *Choisya ternata*, the 'Mexican Orange Blossom'. A medium sized shrub of rounded habit with shining dark leaves, which are distinctly aromatic when crushed.

Early Spring 2021 - mostly dry with a warm spell, followed by some snow

After the wet winter, March was fairly average, with a wet spell from the 9th to 15th and a total rainfall of 67mm. I only recorded frost on three mornings at Hopton Heath and then it was very warm at the end of the month, when I recorded 20C on the 31st.

April, up to the 20th has been dry with only 11mm rain (including 1.5mm snowmelt on 7 April). As there is no forecast of rain for the rest of the month, April could be the driest April in my records (going back to 2007) and has been noted as exceptionally dry by the Meteorological Office, especially in southern England. From 13 to 20 April, it has been mostly sunny with frosts at night and although it has warmed up by day, the month has so far generally been colder than March.

I try to note the first appearance of migrant birds locally and also note when I first see butterflies. There were Sand Martins over the River Teme at Leintwardine on 4 April and also one Swallow. I also saw two Swallows near Kempton on 16 April. Chiffchaffs have been singing for some time but they often overwinter here now. Today (20 April) on a bird survey on Hopton Hill,

I saw one Whitethroat and two Redstarts, summer migrants that arrive from Africa in April.

I saw my first Brimstone butterfly at Hopton Heath on 22 February and two more on 16 March. Peacock butterflies have been around since 31 March, both at home and at Bury Ditches (where I help with a butterfly survey) and I saw a Comma butterfly in my garden on 2 April and a Small White butterfly on 19 April. *Mike Tucker*

Revd Annie Ballard

Easter is when we celebrate Christ's resurrection and is the most important date in the Christian calendar. The celebration this year had a further significance for the Middle Marches Benefice in that it was the last Communion Service at which the Revd Annie Ballard officiated before her retirement at the end of April. St Stephen's Church is the largest in the Benefice and has the advantage of flexible seating. With respect for social

distance guidance the Church was full with a congregation of over fifty people representing all eight Parishes.

Annie gave a very personal and moving sermon in which she outlined her journey of faith. The singing from the choir added greatly to the sense of occasion and Graham Trew's solos were of particular note. The readings and prayers were given by people from across the churches making the service a truly Benefice wide celebration. Mike Jones summarised the feelings of all in a short speech at the end of the Communion as he thanked Annie for her services and contribution to the Church. Margi and Mike presented Annie with a beautiful large shrub which we hope will grace her new garden in Knighton.

We were pleased to host the Easter Sunday Benefice Communion at St Cuthbert's and were only sorry that this was Annie's last officiating service. We wish her a long and happy retirement and are pleased that she will not be too far away.

The Passing of Prince Phillip

In common with churches across the land, a bell at St Cuthbert's Church was tolled 99 times in remembrance of Prince Phillip at 12.00 am on Saturday 10th April. He was further remembered at our Service the following day through our prayers and thoughts as was her Majesty, the Queen, and the Royal family.

General Notices

Revd Annie Ballard's last day as the Vicar of the Middle Marches Benefice of which St Cuthbert's Church is part will be the end of April. The usual process would be for the Benefice to enter into a period of Interregnum during which time we would search for someone to take on the role of vicar. However, the Bishop would like to ask someone to step in and undertake an interim Ministry so that they can provide leadership and pastoral care during the vacancy period without assuming the position of Vicar.

The reason for this is to give time to look at Deanery Boundaries, including the Middle Marches Benefice, with a particular focus on geography they cover. St Cuthbert's Church, Clungunford is the most easterly tip of the Benefice and St Mary's Church, Llanfair Waterdine the most westerly. Going from one to the other is a distance of around 15 miles or 30 'Google' minutes. The discussion is that there may be better ways to organise the Benefice boundaries.

The Bishop believes that an interim ministry would allow those conversations to take place at a pace with which everybody is comfortable. This technically requires what is called a suspension of presentation, in other words a suspension of the right of the patrons to present a new candidate for the benefice while these conversations take

place. The period of suspension can be up to five years, but can be brought to an end at any time once the decisions as to the future are settled.

We will have greater clarity about the practicalities of this change over the next few weeks and we will keep you informed. St Cuthbert's, along with the other churches in the Benefice, has been asked to comment on the proposal. This matter was discussed at the last PCC meeting and the general feeling was that this is acceptable though we would like to continue to be informed and consulted as to progress.

The APCM was held on Tuesday the 27th April. The APCM is a meeting at the Benefice level and covers Benefice wide issues as well as confirming the outcomes of the AGM.

Opening the Church

The Church will be open going forward. It is felt that, given the easing of the corona virus restrictions, we are once more able to leave the Church unlocked and available to be visited and for private prayer.

New post office services in Clungunford

We are very pleased to inform you that as from Thursday 6th May there will be a weekly mobile post office visiting the Village Hall car park in Clungunford between 12-13.00.

We have been negotiating with the Post Office for over a year to get a regular, full postal service in the village and this has now been agreed.

The mobile service will provide the usual Post Office products such as a full postal service, including parcel returns and guaranteed next day service, cashing pensions, free cash withdrawals along with other banking services for most major banks, bill payments and pre-order foreign currency. The parcel return service should be particularly useful with the increase in on-line shopping. Most suppliers allow up to 28 days plus for returns so it will be very convenient to pop up to the Hall on a Thursday rather than queuing in Craven Arms or Ludlow.

Please try the service as it is on a 3-6 month trial and if it is not used then it may be withdrawn, if you have any questions or comments then please let me know.
